Glimpes Given of Halide Edib Hanoun

Miss Clara Bissell Tells of Great Turkish Leader

MISS CLARA BISSELL spoke on Halide Edib Hanoun at the meeting of the literature section of the Upland Women's club Thursday afternoon at the clubhouse. Halide Edib, a modern Turkish woman, well educated and well versed in the history of her own country, has written her memoirs filled in vivid and forceful English the part that her country has played in world affairs. At one time she was an officer in the Turkish army and she has ever been active in separating reforms and education for the men and women of Turkey.

Several years ago there was a plot against the life of Mustafa Kemal, now ruler of Turkey, and several of the men thought to have been active in this plot were killed. Halide's husband, a physician, was implicated and has been forbidden to enter the country, she has not been banned, but her friends consider it wise for her to remain away.

Halide Edib has been married twice. Her first husband, much older than she, was her tutor. He took another wife and she divorced him. Later she married while in Egypt and has two sons, who have been educated in an American university and have returned to Turkey to do the work that their mother is not able to do now in her native country. Halide Edib states that Mustafa Kemal is too much of a dictator. When he wants to bring about a reform he sends forth an edict that the people are compelled to obey. She thinks that many of these reforms should come from the people themselves. His methods are too drastic for a republic.

Halide Edib was graduated from the American College in Constantinople. The senior year of this school she was elected as president more year of an American college. Her mother was a woman of the stand point of a Turkish woman, though she was an educated woman who seeks to be fair to others. Under the new regime the situation in Turkey is being given a chance to assert himself and do something constructive for his country. Under the old regime he was not so popular in Turkey for years, though it was not until several years that it was forbidden. Formerly if a Turkish man wanted to divorce his wife he had but to tell her to go home to her parents. This was said before two witnesses and made the action legal.

Under the new regime, however, divorce is a more formal affair. Polygamy is forbidden now. In her memoirs Halide Edib points out the unhappiness that results in the family from polygamy. The family life under such conditions are far from ideal, according to the words of one who was reared in a family where there were two wives. The books, which Miss Edib reviewed, were not translations from the Turkish, but written in the English language by Halide Edib. The subject is interesting as well as the style in which the books are written. She is a Muslim, and not a Christian.
